This section of your audit provides general information regarding you and your current academic program. In this case, it is indicated that this is the academic evaluation of Program Evaluation Test Student whose major is the 2002 catalog year version of Film Studies.

This section also provides your credit totals. The first two rows refer to Chapman requirements (what must be completed at Chapman). The last row indicates overall requirements.

The first column, the amount of credit that must be completed and the GPA that must be earned. *Program Evaluation only calculates CU GPA*
 The second column, the amount of credit currently complete
 The third column, what is currently remaining
 The fourth column, credit that is in progress
 The fifth column indicates the minimum amount of credit that will be needed if all credit that is in progress is successfully completed.

Also note the key to requirement and sub-requirement statuses at left. These provide a "shorthand" to your progress in each requirement and sub-requirement.

36 credits of upper division (300 or 400 level) coursework are required. This section will give you a count of the number of upper division credits completed, in progress, pre-registered, and remaining. Per your catalog 18 credits must be completed at CU, 12 of those in your major at CU. The remaining 18 credits of upper division coursework may be taken at either CU or from another 4-year college or university.

The Preparatory Skills section of your audit indicates which, if any, prep skills need to be taken. Preparatory Skills courses do **NOT** count toward the 124 credit minimum requirement needed to graduate.

NOTE: All prep skill requirements must be completed by the end of your third semester or you will be placed on probation.

Take this opportunity to note the ***NE** at the end of the Reading subsection. This indicates that the requirement is met by a "Non-course Equivalency", i.e. your SAT score or an AP, IB, or CLEP exam score.

Also note the ***IP** after the Writing subsection. This indicates that a course which is in progress will meet with requirement. You might also see a ***PR** which indicates that a course you have pre-registered for (but has not yet started) will meet the requirement.

Finally, note Math 098 and 099 section with notes "**1 course needed.**" This indicates that not only is the course not currently met, but that no coursework, which is in progress, will meet this requirement.

The Basic Subjects section of your program evaluation will indicate your progress toward the completion of your basic subject requirements.

FFC 100, Written Communication, and the Physical Activities are all considered Basic Subjects.

It is highly recommended that you complete your basic subject coursework as early as possible as these courses are prerequisite to many junior and senior level courses and the skills you will gain are important building blocks in your further studies.

Note: Completed courses may have a *TE notation. This means the requirement was met by a "Transfer Equivalency", i.e. a transfer course.

Chapman's Fine/Performing Arts section calls for the completion of 3 credits in either ART, MUS, TD, or LIT (from the specific ENG courses listed).

The Humanities requirement calls for the completion of 9 credits in a minimum of 2 areas. It is possible to complete the requirement with only three courses, but, depending on the courses taken, it may require more because of the "area" restriction.

Please note the print text of the Humanities "Area" sub-requirement, "Complete 2 of the 4 areas listed below:"

You may not use the discipline of your major to double count in this area. i.e. if you are a REL major you may not use REL in this area, but if a PHIL course is in your REL major, you may double count the PHIL course from your major in your GE Breadth Humanities and in your major.

In the Humanities "Credit" subsection this example indicates the student has completed 6 credits in 1 area. 3 credits in 1 more area (other than Eng) are required to complete both subsections of the Humanities GE Breadth Requirement.

In this example, 6 credits (and 1 area) have been completed. 3 additional credits will be needed from 1 other area.

The History requirement calls for 1 HIST course that is 3 credits.

This course may be transferred in. A course "about history" or the FFC 100 course does **NOT** satisfy this requirement.

The Social Science requirement consists of 6 credits in a minimum of 2 different areas.

You may not use the discipline of your major to double count in this area. i.e. if you are a POSC major you may not use POSC in this area, but if a SOC course is in your POSC major, you may double count the SOC course from your major in your GE Breadth Social Science **and** in your major.

In this example, 6 credits in 2 areas have been successfully completed.

Similar to the humanities requirement, the Natural Sciences requirement is a "requirement within a requirement."

One Life Science and one Physical Science course must be completed.

Of these courses, one must have a LAB component.

The two courses must total at least 7 credits.

Hence, the requirement you see to the left;

First, it is indicated whether Life, Physical, and Lab science components of the requirement are met.

Then below, a count of the total credits completed in the Natural Sciences (in this example 8 credits are complete in the Life Science and Lab component, BUT 3 credits of Physical Science are still required to successfully complete the requirements).

Double counting within the science majors is acceptable.

Quantitative Reasoning:

Completion of one semester of calculus or statistics.

Students who have completed the appropriate math course in transfer will meet the requirement so long as it has been articulated.

Foreign Language:

The foreign language requirement was written to be met only by a 102 level course or higher. If and when a 101 level course is taken, it will appear only in the "Other Courses" section at the end of your audit, as this example shows. (depending on a students language competency level, students may be held for the entire requirement, for the second semester only, or waived from the requirement entirely – refer to your CU catalog).

Students w/ a language major satisfy this requirement. Students having completed 2 years of high school foreign language may enroll directly in 102; those completed 3 years may test out of this requirement.

World Cultures:

World Cultures (non-European) calls for 9 credits (three courses) in a minimum of 2 different disciplines. At least one of the courses must be taken as upper division (300 or 400 level). The upper division level course will be reflected two times, but will only count for credit once.

This course may double count with courses in the major, general education, or electives. It may **NOT** double count with the Human Diversity requirement.

Human Diversity:

The Human Diversity requirement consists of one 3 credit course. This course may double count with courses in the major, general education, or electives. It may **NOT** double count with the World Cultures course.

Both, Human Diversity and World Cultures courses may be transferred in through a petition process.

JWP Examination:

The JWP must be taken after the completion of 60 credits.

The JWP Exam is a "Noncourse" so the requirement is listed on your audit as "1 course needed." Keep in mind that this is really referring to a test. A score of *failure* will require you to take a **course** and the **exam** again. A score of *deficient* gives you the option to re- take the exam or take a class.

Major Requirements:

All coursework required for your major is listed indicating what has been met at Chapman or in transfer and what still remains to be completed.

Major GPA:

Program Evaluation calculates only the Chapman courses.

If your program evaluation does not reflect substitutions, waivers, or transfer articulations that have been agreed upon by your department, ask your Department Chair to either:

- a) Fill out a Revision of Program Requirements Form
- b) E-mail your evaluator directly with the detailed approvals.

Only then can your evaluator make the necessary adjustments to your program evaluation.

NOTE: Only your department's chair, not your advisor, may grant approval for substitutions, waivers, or the use of transfer work for major requirements.

The "Other Courses" section of your degree evaluation should be reviewed carefully. This section indicates all general elective credit, or coursework taken that has not met a specific requirement, but is helping you reach the 124 credit minimum requirement needed for graduation.

Note also the legends for *TE. This course, TRANS is a course you took at your transfer institution and has articulated to one of our courses and is counting toward a requirement.

Note:

Courses with grades of TD+, TD, TD-, or TF do not meet the transfer minimum grade policy of Chapman University.
