Students are given full credit for baccalaureate transfer courses in which a minimum grade of "C-" has been earned.

Remember to forward your CU e-mail to your personal e-mail account.

Program Status refers to the evaluation as a whole. Statuses include Not Started; In Progress; Pending (Anticipated Complete); and Complete. Note: When you register for your final classes the program status will change to reflect a pending completion status.

This section also provides your credit totals. The first two rows refer to Chapman requirements (what must be completed at Chapman). The last row indicates overall requirements.

The **first column**: minimum amount of credit or GPA required.

The **second column**: the amount of credit currently complete.

The **third column**: minimum amount of credit still needed.

The **fourth column**: credit that is in progress or pre-registered.

The **fifth column**: indicates the minimum amount of credit that will be needed if all in progress or pre-registered coursework is successfully completed.

Status Code Key: A status code appears to the left of each individual requirement, as well as any subcomponents within it. In the example to the left the Upper Division requirement is in progress (I). Within that requirement the first portion of 21 UD credits in residency is pending completion (P). The second portion requiring 21 UD credits from any institution is in progress (I). **Statuses include Not Started (N), In Progress (I), Pending Completion (P), Complete (C), and Waived (W).**

42 credits of upper division (300 or 400 level) coursework are required. This section will give you a count of the number of upper division credits completed, in progress, pre-registered, and remaining. Per your catalog 21 credits must be completed at CU, 15 of which must be in your major. The remaining 21 credits of upper division coursework may be taken at either CU or from another 4-year college or university.

Preparatory Skills can be met many different ways. Consult the general education section of your catalog for approved methods.

Preparatory courses (98/99 level) do not count toward the 124 cr. needed to graduate. These credits are deducted from your program evaluation automatically.

Note: Completed courses may have a *NE notation. This means the requirement was met by a "Non-Course Equivalency", i.e. NONC. A NONC can be anything from ACT/SAT (which is not awarded credit) to specific AP/IB (of which some are awarded credit).

FFC 100, Written Communication, and the Physical Activities are all considered **Basic Subjects** (FFC is taken for a letter grade, P/NP is not acceptable).

It is highly recommended that you complete your basic subject coursework as early as possible as these courses are prerequisite to many junior and senior level courses and the skills you will gain are important building blocks in your further studies.

Transfer students who have not yet matriculated to Chapman University may use non-GE coded coursework for our required General Education Breadth Requirements. Once the student has matriculated to Chapman, all rules and guidelines are dictated by the university catalog.

Chapman's **Fine/Performing Arts** section calls for the completion of 3 cr. in either ART, FTV, MUS, TD, COM, or ENG (creative writing) - GE Code FA. You may not use the discipline of your major to double count in this area. Only approved GE coded TD activity courses may be used in the Fine/Performing Arts area, but they may **not** double count with Physical Activity courses.

Approved GE Courses for an upcoming semester can be viewed in the WEB ADVISOR schedule. Select the term in question, and search by course type instead of subject. For the course type use the GE Code listed next to the requirement listed.

A full list of currently approved GE Breadth courses is available on the general education website. Approved courses may vary by term so always search by course type when registering for courses.

The **Humanities** requirement calls for the completion of 9 credits in a minimum of 2 areas. It is possible to complete the requirement with only three courses, but, depending on the courses taken, it may require more because of the "area" restriction.

Please note the print text of the Humanities "Area" sub-requirement, "Complete 2 of the 4 below:"

You may not use the discipline of your major to double count in this area i.e. if you are a REL major you may not use REL in this area, but if a PHIL course is in your REL major, you may double count the PHIL course from your major in your GE Breadth Humanities **and** in your major, *so long as the GE courses are Code approved.* GE Codes: HU, CO, LI, PH, RL.

The **History** requirement calls for 1 HIST course that is 3 credits with the GE Code of HI

A course "about history" and FFC 100 do **NOT** satisfy this requirement. Students majoring in History satisfy this requirement by virtue of their major.

The **Social Science** requirement consists of 6 credits in a minimum of 2 different areas.

You may not use the discipline of your major to double count in this area. i.e. if you are a POSC major you may not use POSC in this area, but if a SOC course is in your POSC major, you may double count the SOC course from your major in your GE Breadth Social Science **and** in your major, *so long as the GE courses are Code Approved.*

Natural Sciences:

The **Natural Science** requirements is composed of two parts. Most students will take Sci-100 or CPSC-230 to complete the foundations portion. Students pursuing the University Honors minor may use Hon-204 to satisfy this portion. The remaining elective course will have a GE CODE of NS and will contain a lab component.

Students majoring in the sciences can fulfill this requirement by completing Biol-204 and Chem-140. These courses can double-count with major requirements.

Transfer students that completed both a biological and physical science, with at least one including a lab component, for a minimum of 7 credits are generally waived from the science requirement if the courses were completed prior to matriculation and had a minimum of a C- grade.

Transfer students that completed a portion of the requirements listed above will have a customized science requirement at the end of their program evaluation.

Students that scored highly enough on certain AP exams may be granted credit to apply towards the foundations portion (Sci-100). The remaining elective (GE Code NS) cannot be in the same subject as the AP exam. Minimum scores are published on the Registrar's website.

Quantitative Reasoning:

Complete one semester of calculus (Math 110) or statistics (Math 203). Students who have completed the appropriate math course in transfer will meet the requirement so long as it has been articulated as equivalent. SBE students may use MGSC 208 for this requirement. Note: Math 104 is a prerequisite for Math 110 & 203.

Foreign Language:

The foreign language requirement can be met by a 102 level course or higher. If and when a 101 level course is taken, it will appear in the "Other Courses." Depending on a student's language competency level, students may be held to the entire req., the second semester only, or may be waived from the requirement entirely – refer to your CU catalog.

Students w/ a language major satisfy this requirement. Students having completed 2 years of high school foreign language may enroll directly in 102; those completed 3 years may test out of this requirement.

JWP Examination:

A score of *failure* will require you to take a **course** and the **exam** again. A score of *deficient* gives you the option to re- take the exam or take an approved course and exam

Major Cont.

If your program evaluation does not reflect substitutions, waivers, or transfer articulations that have been agreed upon by your department, ask your **Department Chair** to either:

- a) Fill out a Revision of Program Requirements Form and send it to a Degree Audit Specialist.
- b) E-mail your DAS@chapman.edu directly with the detailed approvals. Only then can a Degree Audit Specialist make the necessary adjustments to your program evaluation.

NOTE: Only the Department Chair (not your advisor) may grant approval for substitutions, waivers, or the use of transfer work for major requirements.

Students pursuing a Bachelor of Arts degree must complete at least 62 credits outside of the primary discipline of their major. For example a student pursuing a BA in Sociology must complete at least 62 credits in subjects other than Sociology.

BFA, BM, and BS degrees do not require this.

The **“Other Courses”** section of your degree evaluation should be reviewed carefully. This section indicates all general elective credit, or coursework taken that has not met a specific requirement, but is helping you reach the 124 credit minimum requirement needed for graduation.

If coursework is listed in this section that you believe should meet a degree requirement other than general electives, we suggest you

- a) E-mail Registrar One-Stop Services (registrar@chapman.edu) through your CU e-mail account or
- b) You may need to meet with your advisor and/or Dept. Chair. for prior approval.

Transfer courses with grades below a C- are not accepted by Chapman University.

The **Notes** section of the evaluation includes a legend to any codes with asterisks that appear on your evaluation.

You may also see at times ***TE**. This course, TRANS is a course taken at a transfer institution that may have been articulated to one of our courses and is counting toward a requirement or as general elective credit.

Some of the ***NE** courses are either SAT/ACTAP/IB/CLEP/DANTES/WAIVER courses in which a high enough score may award credit for specific courses at Chapman or a high enough score may solely waive a requirement at Chapman and not award any credit.
