Each year thousands of students across the United States complete the CIRP Freshman Survey. The results in this newsletter profile Chapman University's 2020 first-time, full-time entering students. Over 1,600 incoming first-year students completed the online survey during orientation resulting in a 75% response rate. Of the total respondents, 81 were identified as first-generation college students.




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LIFE GOALS
