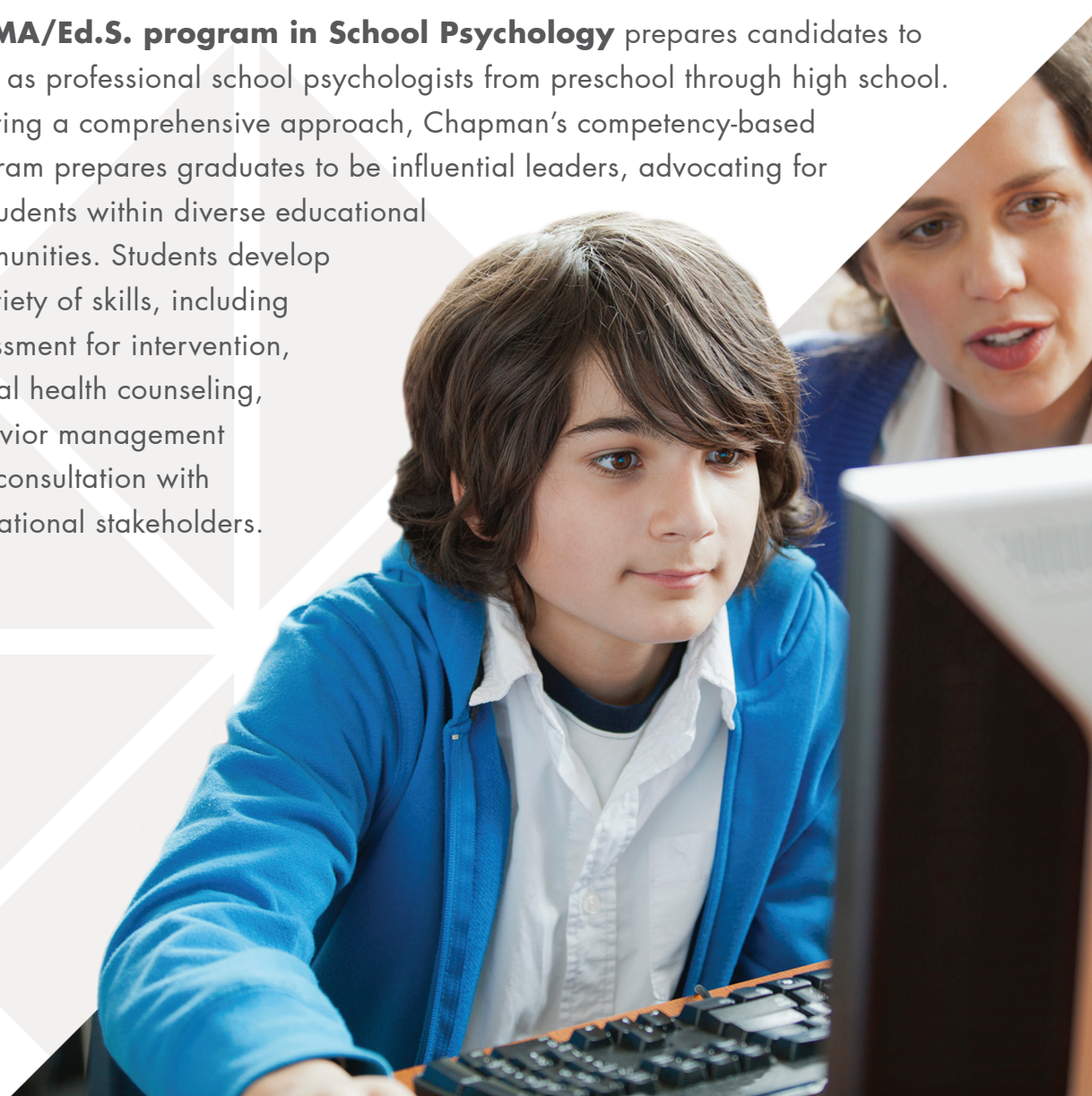


MA/Ed.S. IN SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGY
