


Ph.D. IN EDUCATION

THE Ph.D. IN EDUCATION OFFERS A UNIQUE COMBINATION OF FIVE EMPHASES

Cultural and Curricular Studies

Honors the histories, values and practices of different and overlapping social and cultural groups.

Disability Studies

Explores disability as a social construct and investigates new ways to think about, educate and support individuals who learn differently.

Leadership Studies

Focuses on new ways to think about leadership issues and how to find and solve problems locally, globally and virtually.

Educational Psychology

Examines mental health in K-12 schools and prepares scholars and practitioners to implement effective systems and curricula that address the psychological needs of students.

Teacher Education

Prepares students to become faculty and researchers at colleges and universities where they will help prepare the next generation of pre K-12 teachers and administrators.
