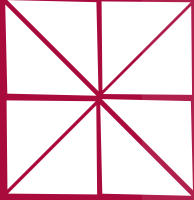


Panther Professional Development Program

Program Overview:

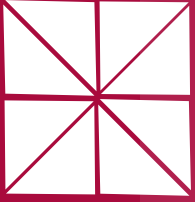
- The National Association of Colleges and Employers has identified Career Readiness Competencies as critical for competitive job candidates

- Work through the Action Plan goals you set with your supervisor throughout your student employment
- Your supervisor will submit your completed Action Plan to the Career and Professional Development Office
- Update your application documents to reflect your accomplishment!



Added Bonuses to On-Campus Student

- Convenience:
 - Proximity: Jobs located on campus make it easy to manage time between work, classes and extra-curricular activities.
 - Flexible Hours: Many on-campus jobs are designed to accommodate class schedules, and supervisors are often more understanding of academic responsibilities
- Academic Alignment:
 - Relevant Experience: Some jobs are directly related to students' majors, providing hands-on experience
 - Mentorship Opportunities: You may find yourself working with professionals who can support you as mentors or offer professional guidance
