CHAPMAN UNIVERSITY DONATES 20 ADVANCED 3D PRINTERS TO OUSD

Chapman University's Fowler School of Engineering has donated 20 advanced 3D printers to the Orange Unified School District (OUSD), helping equip local students with tools that can spark creativity, innovation, and career readiness.

The donation was loaded and prepared for delivery at Chapman's Keck Center for Science and Engineering by engineering students, faculty, staff, and Interim Dean Kendall Harris. The team delivered the printers to OUSD's central warehouse, where Superintendent of Schools Dr. Rachel Monárrez welcomed the Chapman group and expressed appreciation.

"This donation strengthens a pipeline from our local community to Chapman and ultimately to industry," Harris said. "We're helping prepare students for the workforce of tomorrow by giving them access to technology today."

The 3D printers will be distributed across 10 OUSD classrooms, supporting seven Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways and enhancing STEAM (Science, Technology,

Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) curriculum throughout the district. Students will be able to create everything from prototypes to artistic projects, gaining skills that are increasingly valuable in modern industries.

Harris noted that the partnership with OUSD aligns closely with the mission of the Fowler School of Engineering. "We believe engineering is about solving problems that make a difference in people's lives," Harris said. "By placing these printers in local classrooms, we're not only providing equipment—we're empowering students to think like innovators and see themselves as future engineers, designers, and creators."

The gift reflects Chapman's commitment to fostering innovation beyond its own campus and supporting the broader Orange community. Faculty and students in the Fowler School of Engineering regularly partner with local schools and organizations to share expertise, provide mentorship, and inspire the next generation of problem solvers.

Chapman University Creates New Hub for Innovation at Former Killefer School Site Chapman University has officially opened the Daniele C. Struppa Research Park, marking a milestone in the university's role as a leader in quantum research and innovation.

The project transformed the historic Lydia D. Killefer School into a state-of-the-art research facility. A neighborhood landmark, the Killefer School is remembered as one of the first schools in California to integrate students prior to the landmark Brown v. Board of Education decision. By repurposing the site, Chapman has preserved

its legacy while giving it renewed purpose for both education and the community.

"We've built a place where students, faculty, and ideas converge to shape the future of science and society," said Chapman President Emeritus Daniele Struppa.

The Killefer School houses Chapman's Institute for Quantum Studies, where scientists are already producing groundbreaking research. At the same time, the revitalized school was designed with the neighborhood in mind. A historic lobby installation tells the story of the building's impact, while the courtyard and a dedicated meeting space are open for use by local groups and organizations.

Vice President of Campus Planning and Design Collette Creppell said preserving the school's heritage was central to the project, "The bones were good and the vision was strong, so we undertook the adaptive reuse of this national historic landmark."

The Struppa Research Park now serves as both a hub for innovation and a shared community resource, continuing the school's tradition of bringing people together while looking toward the future of discovery.
