



CHAPMAN AND SHANGHAI NORMAL UNIVERSITY PARTNERSHIP EXPANDS WITH SECOND COHORT

Following the successful implementation of a three-year pilot program, Chapman University and Shanghai Normal University (SNU, also known as SHNU) have further expanded their

partnership. Beginning in fall 2020, a second cohort of students from SNU enrolled in the Attallah College of Educational Studies Ph.D. in Education program.



SUPPORTING FUTURE EDUCATORS IN DIVERSE LOCAL COMMUNITIES

To address the critical shortage of qualified teachers in California, Attallah College has formalized key partnerships that open a career pipeline for local community college students. The C-TAG (Chapman Transfer Admission Guarantee) for Future Educators

outlines a pathway for community college students in Orange County who are preparing to become teachers. As part of the C-TAG launch this fall, 10 two-year, full-tuition scholarships would be awarded to community college transfer students who come to Chapman as part of the first cohort in the C-TAG program.



ATTALLAH COLLEGE EARNS STATE, NATIONAL, AND INTERNATIONAL ACCREDITATION

Attallah College earned full national accreditation from the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) for its educator preparation program (EPP), becoming only the second EPP in California to earn CAEP accreditation. In addition to CAEP

and California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) accreditation, Attallah's School Psychology program is one of only five school psychology programs in the US and the only in California to be internationally accredited through the International School Psychology Association (ISPA).

THOMPSON POLICY INSTITUTE HIGHLIGHTS



ACTIVE EDUCATION WEBINAR SERIES

The COVID-19 pandemic and transition to virtual learning has compounded an already serious statewide teacher shortage in California. In an effort to support public education and ensure an uninterrupted pipeline of future educators, the Thompson Policy Institute on Disability (TPI) came together with state and

national partners to develop the California Alliance for Inclusive Schooling (CAIS) Active Education Webinars Series for teacher candidates, serving more than 1,300 participants, with overwhelmingly positive feedback.



FAST MODEL EXPANSION AT CHOC CHILDREN'S

TPI has signed a five-year agreement with the Thompson Autism Center at CHOC Children's to license the Families and Schools Together (FAST) program. The FAST program was designed to assist schools and families of children with disabilities as they navigate the school system, from preschool

through college. Often embedded within neurodevelopmental centers, the FAST program helps families, schools, and community service providers collaborate with one another in order to build an effective, high-quality learning plan for school-age children.



TPI LAUNCHES TRANSITION CA RESOURCE

Working in collaboration with state and local partners, TPI has launched the comprehensive Transition CA website. Designed to improve transition outcomes (such as employment and housing) for people with disabilities, Transition CA provides transition resources related to education, employment, and

where appropriate, independent living skills. The new site includes training information, tools, documents, and resource contacts organized by both stakeholder and subject area.
