Research Summary

I study the interplay between the psychological and biological processes that shape maternal mental and physical health. My interdisciplinary background in evolutionary, biological, and health psychology informs my research in three domains of focus: (1) the psychological impacts of biological changes surrounding pregnancy and breastfeeding, (2) the role of stress and maternal resources in both bolstering or undermining maternal behaviors and health, and (3) the evolutionary origins of maternal behaviors and mental health disorders.
