The Weissmanns learned of another family who committed suicide together to escape the persecution so many Jewish families were facing. At the innocent age of 18, Gerda was torn from her family and sent alone to a forced labor camp, unaware that her mother, father, and brother would be murdered by the Nazis before the end of the war. After an especiallycruel day of hard labor, Gerda felt she was unable to go on. She stood staring at the railroad tracks, alone, pondering how quickly it could all be over.
