
Thomas Bradac (1947-2024)

It is with sadness that I share the news of the passing of Professor Emeritus Tom Bradac. Tom left us on March 13th, surrounded by his family and loved ones, marking the end of a remarkable journey that spanned over five decades of unwavering dedication to the theatrical arts.

Tom joined Chapman University in 1990 and quickly became a cornerstone of our community. His contributions to the Department of Theatre were nothing short of extraordinary. As the founder of Shakespeare Orange County (SOC) theatre, Tom's visionary leadership led the organization to unparalleled success. Under his guidance, SOC was honored as the Arts

Organization of the Year by Arts Orange County and received special recognition for Community Service from the Walt Disney Company. Additionally, Tom established the Grove Shakespeare Festival, earning prestigious accolades including the Hollywood Drama-Logue Publisher's Award for Exceptional Achievement in Theatre.

Internationally recognized, Tom served as the founding director of the Shakespeare Theatre Association, shaping the global landscape of Shakespearean performance.
