### Alcohol and Substance Abuse Policy

#### I. PURPOSE: DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES ACT

The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989 require that institutions of higher education certify that they have adopted and implemented a drug and alcohol prevention program as a condition of receiving funding under any federal program. The Secretary of Education has, as required by the Amendments, issued regulations to enforce the law. #### II. STATEMENT OF PHILOSOPHY

Chapman University has established an alcohol use policy based on the tenet that those serving and drinking alcohol will do so legally and responsibly, with concern for others around them, and with an understanding of the social, personal and legal issues involved. It is the responsibility of persons or groups that use, possess, distribute or produce alcohol to be familiar with and abide by all laws regarding the sale and use of alcoholic beverages. Students hosting events providing alcohol must secure authorization from the Vice President and Dean of Students, or designee, and adhere to the guidelines provided.
