Renata Keller is associate professor of history at the University of Nevada, Reno.


Despite twenty-first-century fears of nuclear conflagrations with North Korea, Russia, and Iran, the Cuban Missile Crisis remains the closest the United States has ever come to nuclear war. Traditionally, that story has been framed as a high-stakes duel between Washington and Moscow for global supremacy, with Cuba cast as the stage. Renata Keller's new book breaks from that familiar script, recasting the crisis in hemispheric perspective and uncovering how its shock waves reverberated across Latin America.
